First-timer's <mark>Venice</mark>

Rowing lessons, lagoon views and food for the mind and body

There's only one way to arrive in Venice and that's by boat. Take the Alilaguna vaporetto (alilaguna.it; rom £11 one way) from the airport for a magnificent view of the lagoon's mirrormooth waters against the skyline of Venice's lomes and towers. Hop out at San Marco and est your four-poster at Hotel Savoia & Jolanda, Grand Canal diva. Citalia (01293 731753, italia.com) has two nights there from £299pp, ull board, with flights. With a matchless view of St Mark's Square, Ristorante Quadri is a oopy-luxy, Michelin-starred restaurant (00 39 041 522 2105, alajmo.it; mains about £50). That means 'raw Piemontese beef with truffle sauce, anchovies, sea urchin and white truffle'.

Venice's food souk, the Rialto Market, is a riot of glowing fruit, veg, still-squirming fish and eagle-eved nousewives. Starthere, then view Venetian

anything else of its era. A plate of spaghetti al nero di seppia (with black cuttlefish ink) is a rite of passage for Venetian first-timers. Try at 'too old and cool to have a website' Osteria Ai Promessi Sposi (00390412412747; mains about £12).

Venetians do it standing up — that's Sun rowing, obviously. Now you can learn, too, thanks to the teachers at Row Venice (rowvenice.org; from £63). As you glide down hidden backwaters, you're as close as you can be to the city's living heart. A seafood lunch at Al Gatto Nero (00 39 041 730120, gattonero.com; mains about £17), on pastelpretty Burano island, should major on the fresh catch of the day, bookended by raw fish antipasti and a Marsala-mighty tiramisu. Your last sunset should see a spritz in your hand and the Grand Canal in your eye. So make sure it's at La Naranzeria (lanaranzaria.it), a warehouseturned-wine bartucked under the Rialto.





First-timer's Berlin

Living history, flea-market bargains and a touch of the burlesque

For a novice, Mitte is the most convenient district and Tegel the easiest airport to get to and from. Berlin is inexpensive, a taxi will only cost £20 to the five-star Ritz-Carlton (00 49 3033 7777, ritzcarlton.com/berlin; doubles from £156, B&B), on Potzdamer Platz — itself a glass-andneon monument to modern Berlin. For dinner, pop next door to Essenza (00 49 30 2579 6856. ristorante-essenza.de; mains about £15) for ravioli with truffle from its Euro menu.

Walk a few blocks east to Sat Kochstrasse to see a chunk of the original Berlin Wall and marvel at

the ingenious escapes from the East at the Checkpoint Charlie Museum (mauermuseum. de; £10). For lunch, try the oriental fusion of Tim Raue's Michelin-starred restaurant nearby (00 493025937930, tim-raue.com; three courses £30). Then head to the evocative Holocaust memorial and stroll through the greenery of Tiergarten to the Brandenburg Gate and Reichstag. To taste the nightlife, hit Kreuzberg: strutinto Bar Marques (Graefestrasse 92) for tapas and cocktails, burlesque Prinzipal (Oranienstrasse 178) for 'A Date with Dita' (bourbon and grapefruit), and end at Watergate Club, a dance den with attractive views over the river Spree (Falckensteinstrasse 49).

Nurse your hangover in the park at the former Tempelhof airport, an iconic Nazi structure, then go shopping in the Hauptbahnhof or bag a bargain in the Mauerpark flea market. More culture? Aim for Museum Island with its five museums — note that the Pergamon altar, one of the main attractions, is under restoration until 2019. Get there Fly to Berlin from Manchester, Heathrow and Birmingham with Germanwings (germanwings.com); fares from £79 return. John Malathronas >
